## **BEAT THE HEAT - STAY COOL, STAY SAFE AS SUMMER HEAT SOARS**

The Meteorologist Service of Jamaica is predicting at least 15 to 20 heatwave days through to the end of August

2023. A heatwave is defined as a period of abnormally hot weather.

### Here are some tips for beating the heat:

**Stay Hydrated:** Drink water throughout the day to prevent dehydration. Avoid excessive caffeine and alcohol.

**Stay Cool at Home:** Use fans, open windows during cooler times, or use air conditioning if possible. Close curtains to block out sunlight. *Cont. pg 2* 

### Heat Wave Tips

- \* Avoid the heat by staying out of the sun, especially between 11am and 3pm
- \* Keep rooms cool by using shades and reflective material & light coloured curtains
- \* Have cool baths and showers
- Drink cold drinks and avoid tea, coffee and alcohol
- Wear loose & cool clothing and a hat when outdoors

### **BEAT THE HEAT - STAY COOL, STAY SAFE cont.**

**Dress for Coolness:** Opt for loose, lightweight and light-colored clothing to help your body stay cool. **Limit Outdoor Activities:** Schedule outdoor activities during cooler hours like early morning or evening.



Several Hellshire residents were featured on Television Jamaica's Prime Time News on June 21 in a featured story on the extreme heat and how they are coping.

All the residents interviewed represented themselves and their communities well and we were proud to see Hellshire in a positive light in the national spotlight.



### **SARGASSUM HERE TO STAY**

Ongoing research on the patterns and predictions of sargassum seaweed deposits have identified Hellshire as the worst affected area, according to a recent Gleaner article.

The yellow-brown seaweed has been observed along the eastern and southern coastlines of Jamaica for several years, creating massive pileups that scientists say may increase.

"Get used to it. Sargassum is here to stay, and it's likely to get worse ..." was the response from Technical Project Coordinator Darren Fletcher during a Gleaner interview at the Mona Geoinformatics Institute at the University of the West Indies, Mona. "By October, we used to see sargassum beaching completely gone, but now, even in December, it is still there. So the sargassum season is like a year-round thing and it is very difficult to combat," he said. "Hellshire is the worst affected in terms of the frequency of sargassum beaching, in terms of severity, in terms of volume as well because in the severe months, on a 100-metre stretch of coastline we can see 100 to 150 metres cubed of sargassum. So in terms of height, we have seen from a metre to three metres, so the sargassum then is, basically, taller than us."



The unsightliness of the piles of brown seaweed strewn along bathing beaches such as Fort Clarence and Wavez Beach prevent people from enjoying the seaside. The decaying sargassum also emits a smell said to be akin to rotten eggs, which seems linked to increased respiratory complaints. ".. We have some people complaining of respiratory illnesses, especially if they have a history of sinus, asthma, or some other pre-existing respiratory conditions," Anderson noted. Solid waste such as plastic and glass bottles also gets trapped in the bands of sargassum and deposited onshore, making an existing pollution issue worse. (Source: Gleaner)


### **ILLEGAL DUMP SITES CLEARED**

Residents are reminded that dumping is not allowed in these areas. Plans are underway to prevent the areas from being used for this purpose by unscrupulous persons.


Hellshire residents are encouraged to report any persons seen dumping in these areas as we continue efforts to maintain the natural beauty of our communities.

### **CHILD SAFETY TIPS FOR SUMMER**

- 1. Always supervise children under 12.
- 2. Create a list of emergency numbers and keep them easily accessible.
- 3. Establish rules for older siblings and communicate responsibilities.
- 4. Regularly check in with children, especially if parents have a busy schedule.
- 5. Provide close supervision during swimming activities.
- 6. Ensure pools are inaccessible without adult supervision.
- 7. Discourage unsupervised visits to rivers or beaches.
- 8. Prioritize sufficient supervision for summer activities and events.
- 9. Supervise and limit children's use of stoves and potentially harmful equipment.
- 10. Keep lighters, matches and foreign objects out of children's reach.

### CALL OR TEXT WITH ANY INFORMATION



The iconic crocodile could be joined by the beautiful Blue Kite Swallowtail butterfly as a symbol of the Hellshire area. This endemic butterfly found in only four sites in Jamaica is regarded as endangered. The butterfly has long been regarded as a symbol of transformation, hope and faith.

The Blue Kite Swallowtail is the smallest of the island's swallowtail butterflies and is found in four small breeding sites in Hellshire, Roselle in St Thomas, Rio Bueno in St Ann and Crownlands, Trelawny. These fast-flying black and bright blue insects with a red stripe are easily recognised in the field.

Coastal Area Management (C-CAM) Foundation hosted a virtual workshop on June 30 aimed at developing a conservation plan for the Blue Kite Swallowtail butterfly. The Blue Kite Swallowtail was accorded IUCN Red List status as

'Vulnerable' in 1985, with considerable adverse changes to the restricted habitat where this species occurs over these past 38 years leaving the continuing survival of the species in grave doubt. Submissions are now being made by local scientists to have this status re-assessed as 'Critically Endangered'.

There were virtually no sightings in 2022 and 2023, leading to a call shared with Hellshire residents for greater awareness, observation and reports of any sightings.

Threats to the species include farming activity, charcoal burning and forest fires, with the main danger being reduced numbers of Black Lancewood trees, the only known food for the Blue Kite Swallowtail larvae or caterpillars. Changes in annual rainfall patterns will also have a severe impact on future populations, as the adult butterfly only emerges after extended period of heavy rain. These rains have traditionally been in May and October, but unpredictability due to climate change has made this cycle unreliable.

There is no conservation plan currently in place for this species, with C-CAM leading the effort to design and implement strategies to protect the habitat of Black Lancewood stands and save the beautiful Blue Kite Swallowtail butterfly from becoming further endangered.
